DESCRIPTION OF THE ASSISTANCE PROGRAM FOR LAC-MÉGANTIC

The Red Cross Assistance Program is designed to complement government help and items covered by insurance policies held by program recipients.

The program is intended not to replace losses, but to address basic necessities such as shelter, food, clothing, personal care items, baby supplies, physical and psychological care requirements, transport, and job relat-

ed and business resumption needs. It also covers the specific needs of grieving families and children who have lost one or both parents. Priorities for the type of assistance offered will first and foremost address the needs of the most vulnerable.
