How to use an epinephrine auto-injector

When to use an epinephrine auto-injector

Use when a person has anaphylaxis – a severe allergic reaction that can be life-threatening.

The air passages may swell, making breathing difficult.

Anaphylaxis can be caused by insect stings, food, medications, or other allergens.



How to help a person use an epinephrine auto-injector



- 1. Call EMS/9-1-1
- 2. Remove the safety cap.



3. Firmly push the tip of the epinephrine auto-injector against the outer thigh.
A click should be heard. Hold in place for 5 to 10 seconds.



- **4.** Rub the injection site for 30 seconds.
- 5. If the person's condition does not improve within 5 minutes, repeat the dose.
