# LIFE SLOWLY RETURNS TO NORMAL FOR TSUNAMI SURVIVORS

The small town of Hisanohama was badly hit by the tsunami. Residents tried to salvage their valuables from the ruins but their efforts were mostly in vain, as almost everything they owned had been carried away and destroyed by the tsunami.

"We lost everything in the tsunami" said Mr. Toshikatsu Endo, 51, who had a small grocery store in the town.

Mr. Endo used to live on the second floor of his store. When the tsunami hit the building, it destroyed his home as well as his business.

To help families like Mr. Endo's get back on their feet, the Red Cross provided sets of electrical household appliances. Thanks to support from donors, more than 133,000 households received a microwave, rice cooker, hot water dispenser, refrigerator and washing machine after moving into temporary housing.

Now, five years later, Mr. Endo has opened a new grocery store in a temporary facility. It is smaller than the old one, but he is back in business and making a living for himself and his family.



"When the Red Cross gave us an emergency relief package with all the most important household appliances, I was really happy. It was at that point I felt that life had at last gained some semblance of normality." – Mr. Endo
